

What is E-Waste, and what happens to it?

Electronic Waste (E-Waste) materials are electronic components that have been discarded and are no longer in operation.

Any appliance using electricity has the potential to cause harm to the environment, if not disposed of responsibly.

Unwanted electronic items are either:

- Buried in a landfill and left to decay and leak dangerous chemicals into the environment
- Be recycled in a safe, environmentally-friendly fashion that allows for parts of the electronics to be salvaged and reused.



E-Waste materials include:

- Computer monitors, personal computer units, laptops and keyboards
- Televisions
- VCR, DVD and Blu-ray players
- Video game consoles
- Microwaves, toasters and coffee makers (small household appliances)
- Refrigerators, freezers, washers and dryers and dishwashers (large household appliances)
- Copiers, scanners and fax machines
- Stereos and radios
- Clothing irons
- Hairdryers and straighteners
- Lighting equipment
- Electronic tools
- Telephones and mobile phones
- Automatic dispensers
- Toys and sports/leisure equipment
- Monitoring and control instruments
